The Middle Grades Teacher Preparation Program was first accredited by NCATE in 1955, and that accreditation has continued uninterrupted. Dr. Lounsbury's pioneering contributions laid the foundation for this Program to become an "Architect of Change." Today faculty continue to systematically assess students, assignments, courses, and the program to ensure that the Middle Grades program remains on the cutting edge of teacher preparation.

In the late 1960's and early 1970's faculty at GCSU took the first steps in developing the current middle grades teacher preparation program and implemented a Junior High

Endorsement. In 1978, students could pursue a degree in Middle Grades Education and licensure in grades 4-8. The program has had until the recent economic downturn a 99% job placement rate (JHL College of Education Survey).

The success of graduates is largely due to the innovative mentored, field based cohort model, which provides Mentor Leaders (i.e., individual faculty assigned to a particular cohort) that follow cohorts through their entire time in the program. It ensures a solid liberal arts grounding and extensive and diverse field experiences (4 different placements during the junior year; at least 5 different placements overall; more than 800 hours of field placement prior to student teaching; and at least 5 weeks of full-time teaching during their 10-week student teaching experience).

The success of the Program is based on a strong ethic of collaboration that faculty model daily as they co-plan, co-teach, and share supervising responsibilities. Faculty members expect teacher candidates to participate in service learning and action research; they expect students to submit proposals and present their own ideas. Over the last 3 years 100% of the Middle Grades candidates have presented at a state, regional, or national conference. Officers of the GC CMLA chapter have worked with the Georgia Middle School Association (GMSA) to have an officer who serves as a CMLA Liaison on the GMSA Board of Directors and a regularly scheduled statewide CMLA meeting during the GMSA conference. Most importantly, every October for the past seven years, the GC CMLA chapter plans, organizes and implements a statewide Middle Level Summit to bring teacher candidates and middle level educators together on the Georgia College campus with nationally renowned middle level educators. This fall keynote speakers were Drs. James Beane and Barb Brodhagen, known nationally and internationally for their philosophy and work related to democratic classrooms and integrated curriculum.

The success of the chapter is based on the faculty members who willingly have worked together as a *team of advisors* to support the growth and development of CMLA members and the chapter itself. This advisory structure has provided the chapter continuity and stability as well as new and challenging ideas from year to year.
